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big government...to regulate an industry that we haven't seen really has demonstrated some harm on our citizens, other than parents being upset that their kids got a tattoo or a piercing without permission. So with that, thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Bourne. Senator Stuhr, your light is on, but you have spoken three times. And I would recognize you for your closing, as there are no further lights on, if you would like.

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members of the body. I was hoping that we might just address this amendment, because I wanted to make clear that we have been working with Health and Human Services, and that this is an issue. We would not have the Nebraska Medical Association supporting it, the Dental Association, the Nebraska Board of Health, if they did not feel that this was an issue that needed to be addressed. And that is one reason that we are bringing the bill. We are not going to be adding a lot of new people, because we have included it under the Cosmetology Act. We're not looking at a large number of facilities. But we do, and I do, feel very strongly that we have come to a point, and in fact I think we're past time, in looking at regulating this industry. And so I would hope that you would support these amendments. Again, they come from Health and Human Services, and they are very technical in nature. With that, I thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Stuhr. You've heard the closing on the Stuhr amendment to the committee amendments. All in favor of the amendment please vote aye, and opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of Senator Stuhr's amendment to the committee amendments.

SPEAKER BROMM: The amendment is adopted. We're back to the committee amendments, as amended. There are no lights. Senator Jensen, you're recognized to close on the committee amendments.
