SENATOR CHAMBERS: You object on the grounds that it would intend to incriminate or entangle your bill in political difficulty.

SENATOR AGUILAR: Very well put.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Aguilar, when we're dealing with safety, like we are in this bill, would you agree that the circumstances are either safe,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...or that they are not?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Would you ask that again?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Do you agree that either this situation is a safe situation, or it is not a safe situation?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. And he had said that before, but since we're starting on a new day, I want these items in the discussion. It is unsafe conditions that we're talking about in this bill. You cannot make them safe by simply saying if it involves a farmer, or if the truck is being driven in a rural area. That won't wash because it applies even if the truck is in Omaha. And if the driver is not a farmer, it covers the whole state, but it creates a second-class child, wherever that child happens to be located. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time. Thank you, Senator Chambers and Senator Aguilar. Senator Chambers, you may continue, as your light is next.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, to take up the thread where I set it down, if you have a red Chevy pickup truck, the year that you bought this vehicle was 2003, the model...the year of the vehicle was 2003.
