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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, Senator, based on your comments, are you aware of any place in the statutes where the Legislature affirmatively gives a license to place children in dangerous situations without liability? That's what this exception does. If they're in the open bed of the pickup or in the cargo area of the other truck, they don't have to be restrained. We would be affirmatively saying you can use children in this way and, under this law that addresses that issue, you are exempt from responsibility.

SENATOR FOLEY: And Senator Aguilar has said that he agrees with you on that; that he agrees that there should be no exception, but he's trying to at least improve the situation.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, let me ask you a question. If I said I agree with you on the bills you bring to protect what you refer to as unborn children, however, I've got to oppose your legislation, of what value is my stating that I agree? If all of my conduct is going to be in opposition to what you're doing, does it help you for me to say, nevertheless, I agree with what you're saying?

SENATOR FOLEY: No, I didn't vote on that last amendment. I'm trying to puzzle through this myself and figure out how we can get at least a more safe system in place in light of the political realities that we're facing here.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why don't we try this?

SENATOR FOLEY: And that's what Senator Aguilar has been working on.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why don't we as a Legislature enact a responsible bill and let it be unenforced by law enforcement persons at their own peril, rather than our saying that we think this evil or this problem should be addressed but we're not going to address it in the way we should in order to grant a concession to those law enforcement people who are not going to do their job?

SENATOR FOLEY: Well, I don't know. Maybe there's some language
