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using good judgment, and I don't feel that it's worth doing that, penalizing all the people who do use good judgment out there.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are you a practical politician, Senator Baker?

SENATOR BAKER: I don't know. Sometimes I may be; sometimes I'm not, probably.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How would you like to characterize yourself, if you could live up to the characterization?

SENATOR BAKER: A realist.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: A realist. All right. Now, you have some bills that impact on rural interests, and I disagree with them because I think judgment ought to be allowed to come into play and we shouldn't legislate. So I will then be in the position you're on. The position you're in on this bill, I will then be in that position on your bill.

SENATOR BAKER: I understand that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is that a fair exchange?

SENATOR BAKER: I understand that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, is that a fair exchange?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes. That's...yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR BAKER: You have every right to do what you please with the bills on the floor.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now I have another question to ask you. Do you have a sheriff in your county?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes.
