talked the other day, an attorney doesn't have...an attorney doesn't have that much training. An individual coming out of medical school can become a cardiologist with less training. And so my point is I think this is hugely burdensome for a person to have 6,000 hours worth of experience. But my question is, okay, if we pass this statute, the Department of Health and Human Services will make regulations based on our statute, and my concern is, is that if we say to grandfather in you need 6,000 hours of education and we leave it open to the department as to what is proper experience, on the other hand, to get in, they might think that the standard or the burden that a tattoo artist or a body artist has to meet was 6,000 hours of experience. And if that's the case, then I think that we've set up an unnecessary barrier to entry into the body artist practice.

SENATOR STUHR: Could I...I would like to comment...

SENATOR BOURNE: Please.

SENATOR STUHR: ...on that, because actually what we're doing is just grandfathering those businesses that are in business right now, and if they can document that kind...we are not requiring that everyone have 6,000 hours.

SENATOR BOURNE: I under...

SENATOR BOURNE: Sure, I understand that, but what we are saying...

SENATOR BOURNE: ...what we are saying is that in order to grandfather in you have to have 6,000 hours. That's one way of entry into the field. The other way of entry in the field is a person must comply with the Nebraska Cosmetology Act, must be 18 years, must have a high school diploma or equivalent education, and must submit evidence of completion of education and training as prescribed by the board.
