will look, when they go to make...or the Health and Human Services, when they go to make rules and regs to carry out the purposes of this act, they will look at the bill; they will see that, oh, the Legislature intended there to be 6,000 hours of experience for grandfathering in; they must have intended that our minimum criteria be 6,000 hours in order for a new person to get into the business. What I'm saying to you is that that is a huge burden. So a person goes to become a body artist, they have to work at a store for over three years before they can take the test, and for Senator Stuhr to say that's not the case, I don't see how. If we've said the minimum level is 6,000 for grandfathering in, there's no way the department will say, oh, okay, well, it's only going to be 200 hours for a new artist. That's not the case. They will absolutely say 6,000 hours. So I think that's something that needs to be dealt with. I have some other questions, if Senator Stuhr would yield.

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Senator Stuhr.

SENATOR STUHR: Yes.

SENATOR BOURNE: And again, Senator Stuhr, I can't make it any more clear to you, I support your concept, but I am concerned that we're overregulating this industry. On page 20 of the bill, it talks about the license of a body art facility that has been revoked for any reason may not be reinstated. Then it goes on to say, "An original application for licensure shall be submitted and approved before such facility may reopen for business." Do we do that to any other entity if...require them, if the license is revoked, rather than cure? And under this statute, the Department of Health would have the ability to revoke a license if the place was unclean. Can you respond? Do we ever...do we allow...

SENATOR BOURNE: ...do we allow a business to be shut down and not be reinstated in any other case?
