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think we need to balance the amount of regulation versus the harm to the public, and I...and I think that this kind of goes a little bit too far, although we should regulate this industry. I have another question on page 8. It talks about the definition of "permanent color technology," and it says inserting dyes or pigments into the skin upon the body of a live human being so as to form indelible, which is permanent, marks for cosmetic or medical purposes. And so I'm concerned with the second paragraph or second part of that sentence there--medical purposes. And the thing that comes to mind is I know some people that undergo radiation therapy. The doctor will mark on their body lines to direct the radiation beams, and I'm concerned that this act will pick up those radiologists or techs and require them to become certified body artists in order to apply such a guiding device for radiation. Because when you go then on page 21, there's exceptions to the act. It says the "Cosmetology Act does not apply to or restrict the activities of the following:" and then subparagraph (5) it says, "Any person practicing cosmetology, electrology, esthetics, or nail technology within the confines of a hospital, nursing home." And I think because we've added the new language "cosmetology, electrology, esthetics, or nail technology" to the exemptions, you've included those individuals who apply indelible marks to radiation patients. And so I think the act goes a little too far. I think we need to strike, and I'll do an amendment to...for this, or if Senator Stuhr would rather. I'm more than willing on a bill like this to...of course, Senator Chambers wouldn't agree, but I'm more than willing to vote to move this to Select and come up with an amendment between General and Select File that makes sense to me. But again, I think it goes a little too far. I think that we've included permanent color technology within individuals who do radiation therapy, and whether those marks are permanent when they go on there, my understanding is, is the radiation beam could make them permanent. So I think we've included these individuals inadvertently. And again, I think we should delete that second paragraph. I think that the owners of a body artist store...
