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must be, and things such as that which do not go to the basic structure. We can work our way through all of those things and I will invoke, at this point, a principle that I stated for myself earlier in the session. I do not want us to see an advantage or a worthwhile practice in the tactic of advancing a bill from General File which needs considerable work. To do that simply means that General File, where the heavy lifting is to be done, will no longer serve that purpose, and that heavy lifting will be transferred to Select File, which means we do the heavy lifting there, and Final Reading will then have to be what Select File had traditionally been. Then I offered an exception. If there's a bill on which there is generalized agreement, and even if not, the parties that have a fundamental interest in the bill have agreed to work together on the issues that have been identified, I do not see a problem with advancing a bill of that kind. Because there will be work done in the interim, by that I mean between General File and the time the bill is considered again, that will take the place of having tried to do all the work on the floor during Select File consideration. So I'm going to, when I'm recognized to close, withdraw my amendment. I will not offer any more amendments to the bill at this point, but I will discuss with Senator Stuhr and Senator Bourne the items we've identified in the bill, and there may be others. To be quite frank with you, I've been occupied with other matters during prior debates and I haven't had a chance to thoroughly review this amendment that we're talking about. Thanks to Senator Bourne's, and I don't know who else may have raised issues, but at least the issues that he raised, thanks to his alertness, the bill did not just move without these problems being identified. If they can all be addressed, it won't be necessary for me to say much of anything on Select File, except to state my agreement with the bill and support for it. If there are items where agreement cannot be reached, at least they will have been lifted out of the context of the whole bill and focus can be placed there. It then becomes a matter of a knock-down-drag-out to see who is going to, while standing eyeball to eyeball, blinks first.
