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defaults on the contract to make payments, this is what the ones in this contract will do. Well, anyway, Section 2 allows any public entity to enter into a contract for the purchase of electric power generated by a project; allows the contract to include provisions which would require the public entity to accept and pay for additional power if another public entity defaults on the contract, to make payments regardless of whether power is provided,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...produced or delivered, or whether the project is completed, operable or operating, and notwithstanding suspension, interruption, interference, reduction or curtailment of the output of the project. The next time I'm recognized, that is what I would like to discuss with you. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Vrtiska, Natural Resources Committee amendment. Senator Vrtiska. He waives the opportunity to speak. Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Senator Schrock, can I ask you a question?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schrock, would you yield to a question from Senator Hartnett?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Yes, I will, Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: On this page that you passed out, the participants, how did you arrive at those numbers, like the city of Grand Island would contribute, you know?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Senator Hartnett, this is the sheet handed to me by the industry and it's what OPPD has already entered into or is entering into, is entering into agreement with these facilities, with these other entities, to build this plant. Now, without this plant, why, they would probably...without this cost sharing they would probably only build a 300-megawatt facility, but the 600 megawatt would be more efficient. I can tell you that in NPPD's situation they're more than happy to
