SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...as humble as that abode may be, so if she's going to purchase soap, bleach, other household necessities, she, with her shaking little hand, has to put not only the cost of it but the tax also. We will tax widders. We will tax orphans. If the orphan comes and makes a purchase and it's not food, then the orphan pays the tax without batting an eye. But these churches can be clothed in gold, the preachers and the other employees can fare sumptuously every day at the preacher's mansion or at some huge structure built for banquets, and not pay a penny of tax on any of it, and I...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...I think that is immoral. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. You've heard the opening on FA1456, offered by Senator Chambers to LB 841. (Visitors introduced.) On with discussion of the Chambers amendment, FA1456, Senator Byars, followed by Senators Janssen, Bourne, Kremer, and Chambers. Senator Byars.

SENATOR BYARS: Thank you, Mr. President. And, in all due respect, Senator Chambers, as I briefly looked at the language that you wish to strike, I totally misinterpreted what it was that you are intending to do. I know your passion on this issue, but I agree with Senator Bourne. As much as we should have discussions of issues of this magnitude, I think it probably should be in the Revenue Committee rather than here on the floor of the Legislature. What will happen...could I engage you, Senator Chambers, for a moment, please?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, would you yield to Senator Byars?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes. Yes, I will.
