SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Stuthman. Senator Vrtiska, followed by Senator Chambers.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. I'd like to have a moment to visit with Senator Chambers, if he has the time.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, would you yield?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If you've got the question, I've got the time.

SENATOR VRTISKA: (Laugh) Thank you, Senator Chambers. I was just curious in your discussion about religious organizations and their ability to not pay tax on certain things. It's my understanding, and I guess I'd ask you the question, do you think that organizations like the Community Action Council should also pay taxes?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It depends on the magnitude. First of all, they don't conduct selling...they don't sell like other businesses do.

SENATOR VRTISKA: But they don't pay taxes on their facilities and those kinds of things either, as I understand it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, I'm not talking about a property tax here on the churches and the religious people either. I'm just talking about the sales, rental, purchases, and so forth.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, the only reason I brought it up, Senator, was is that the service they provide is some of the service you were talking about to some of the poor people that do not have the wherewithal, and I'd have to add that many of the churches that I'm aware of do the same thing. They provide some services for those that are poor and those who need help. And so, in some sense, you're talking about the same people, the same agency, and I don't know how you can differentiate that dramatically from one to the other when...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Easily.
