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SENATOR HARTNETT: Okay. Is this going to save the state money or cost the state money, Senator Louden, this...your amendment?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Louden.

SENATOR LOUDEN: It would cost the unemployment insurance some money. I don't think the state...

SENATOR HARTNETT: I meant it would cost, okay, unemployment insurance. I think we're having problems keeping that up right now, as I understand it.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Well, I think it...somewhere we had a fiscal note on that, and it was somewhere between 60 and 110 thousand, or something like that, is what it was going to cost the state.

SENATOR HARTNETT: (inaudible).

SENATOR LOUDEN: There aren't a great deal of people that they are involved in this. It's just those few people on the lower end of the Social Security benefits.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Okay, thank you, Senator.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Hartnett. Senator Bourne. He waives his time. Thank you, Senator Bourne. Senator Chambers, on the Louden amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'd like to ask Senator Louden a clarifying question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Louden, will you yield to a question?

SENATOR LOUDEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Louden, I've been looking mainly at the underlying bill, and then I picked up what you were saying, but I was trying to read your amendment at the same time. Does your amendment say, basically, that...well, what does it say with reference to the insurance, in your amendment, that will not count against the person?
