And I did make a commitment in committee that I wouldn't try to change the bill to make it more onerous, I wouldn't try to get rid of the unemployment insur...or get rid of more weeks' time. But I also, at this point, do not feel like we should settle for less weeks' time. We've got to remember, we are dealing only with people that quit on their own free will and without good cause, or are fired for misconduct. I'd like to address Senator Bourne's concerns. He said that the people on unemployment insurance now aren't getting rich with the amount of money they make. But we need to realize that the amount that we pay on unemployment to our unemployed people is maybe less than it could be because we put so many additional people on the system that should not be on the system. And we need to remember the unemployment system should be there for people that through no fault of their own lose their job. And we need to take care of those people. Another thing I'd like to bring up, in Senator Bourne's case, with his constituent, there is an appeals process. And first place, I would tell you that if his constituent actually had a ten-week waiting period, she must have had quite a serious offense, or at least the adjudicator thought so, because they very seldom ever give a ten-week wait period. So it must have been a serious offense. But if she or anybody else is disqualified by the adjudicator, they can go to...they can appeal to an administrative law judge, and if they're not happy with that decision, they can appeal to the district court. So there is a process in place for them. Senator Chambers talked about, he's against the bill because this proves what a terrible economy we have and people, you know, they have no choice. Well, they do have a choice. The only people that are affected by this bill are people that quit without good cause on their own free will, or that are fired for misconduct. So I believe that the bill as it is written is good, and at least most of these amendments, I will oppose them. Thank you.
