SENATOR CHAMBERS: Already?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Already, Senator Chambers. I'm sorry. Clock keeps going. Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you. Mr. President and members, I'd like to get back to my amendment, because I didn't take very long to explain it when I introduced it. But first of all, I know Senator Bourne has been trying to ask me a question, but I was on the phone. And now he's on the phone, but he just got off. So Senator Bourne, if you would like to have some of my time to ask some of your questions?

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Senator Schimek. I appreciate that. Actually, your amendment amends Senator Louden's amendment.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: That's correct.

SENATOR BOURNE: And Senator Louden's would say that an individual that receives Social Security retirement benefits would no longer have those benefits considered income for purposes of qualifying for workers' comp...or, workers' comp, excuse me, unemployment. That's an accurate statement. Senator Louden is nodding. So exactly what does your amendment then add to his? I see the language, insert "compensation related to military service in an international conflict or national emergency." So would military individuals receive unemployment benefits if they're serving in an international conflict or a national emergency?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Not necessarily, and that's what I wanted a chance to explain. And do you want me to go ahead and take the time to do that now?

SENATOR BOURNE: Please do.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay.

SENATOR BOURNE: Please explain, because that was kind of my question. I just wanted some clarification as to what your
