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dealing with real live flesh and blood people who are in a bad way. As prudish as I am in my own personal life, I don't try to put my standards on anybody else. I don't go to the show, I don't go to dances, I don't go to bars, I don't go to taverns. My life is a "don't" life. I don't smoke, I don't drink, I don't use drugs, I don't curse, I don't chase women, or men. But I don't put that standard on anybody else.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But these people who are supposed to be so imbued with righteousness and tolerance and forgiveness are so cruel, so unyielding, so strict, and willing to punish others in a way they don't want to be punished themselves, treat people with a harshness they don't want to receive. Well, treat these people with harshness, and let me see if I can demonstrate by the way I'll conduct myself on the floor what harsh treatment is. Now, that doesn't mean I'm going to walk up and pop somebody in the nose. That's too easy. I want you to, in a leisurely way, meditate on your misdeeds, and realize that the punishment that I inflict has been merited. And I want you to just bow your head and thank God that you're getting your punishment here from me instead of in hell, Senator Cunningham, where body and soul are destroyed.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'll save you from that.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Cunningham, followed by Senators Johnson, Schimek, Janssen, Beutler, and Loudon. Senator Cunningham.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Thank you, Senator Cudaback and members. Obviously Senator Chambers and I have a difference of philosophical opinion. But I'll start first with asking a question of Senator Schimek.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schimek, would you yield?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you.
