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people, and I hate to see us destroy that anyway, but on the other hand, I understand Senator Cunningham's position. You know, there are some people who do use the system occasionally. With that, I had promised some of my time to Senator Chambers. Senator Chambers, I hope I haven't taken too much of it up. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: How much time is left, Mr. President?

SENATOR CUDABACK: About 2, 22.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, 2, 22. Thank you to you. Members of the Legislature, I've talked about the number of young men and women who have died in Iraq, and from March to this month, I'm going to give you some figures. Young people dying for nothing. It's why Senator Schimek's amendment has allure, and I'll vote for anything like that, whether I think it's practical or not, as a statement. In March of last year, 65 died; April, 73; May, 37; June, 29; July, 46; August, 35; September, 30; October, 43; November, the bloodiest month, 82. Then Saddam was captured, December 13. For the month of December, 40; the month of January, 45. His capture was supposed to do so much. I said it wouldn't do anything, that there would be more deaths. And sure enough, the toll on these young people is rising. Well, now they want to hightail it out of Baghdad and turn the mess that they made over to other countries. But you still have 130,000 young people there, and 20,000 doing other things other than combat...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...duty; 150,000 young people there for nothing. I'm going to support Senator Schimek's amendment. It will not be enough to make support Senator Loudens', and it certainly will not be enough to make me support this atrocious bill. I wanted to ask Senator "Clever Hog," or Cunningham, if he still has that job with those merchants that they gave him, but I don't see him here. I'm going to get in his business, if I can. Thank you, Mr. President.
