SENATOR CHAMBERS: Let me ask a more basic question. Do you believe women are discriminated against on the basis of gender in this society when it comes to employment opportunities?

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And the punishment now is a maximum of ten weeks. You feel that we should up that amount of punishment, correct?

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: I most definitely do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. I started to call you "Mr. Scrooge," but I don't want to insult Mr. Scrooge. Thank you, Senator Cunningham.
