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because if it's established by case law it's kind of difficult, you know, this is good cause, this is good cause, but this isn't, and it's hard to distinguish. But can you give us kind of a sense of what good cause is.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Well, it's...it really is kind of hard to do that, Senator Bourne. It does go back to case law. Most of these cases that I've been telling about I consider gross misconduct, and they shouldn't collect unemployment at all. And in our current system, under gross misconduct you do not collect unemployment at all. But...

SENATOR BOURNE: Well, okay, let's ask a couple examples then. Say I'm currently employed, and I decide to leave that employment because I can double my salary at a new employer. I go to start my new employer, and for some reason I'm one of the 2,300 people that applied for 300 jobs, and I mistakenly thought I had a new job and I really didn't because, of course, we had several thousand applicants for just a couple, or a handful of jobs. I thought I had the job; I didn't. I've already left my employer, and I left to better myself. I went from a trash collector to becoming a dishwasher, or whatever. Do...is that good cause?

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: I couldn't answer that, Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. So leaving one job to get...to better myself wage-wise, you don't know if that's with cause or not?

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Well, normally when they do that they have the job secured before they do that.

SENATOR BOURNE: Right. Well, I'm sure that you've heard of situations where an individual has, you know, gotten a job, and then for some reason or another it didn't pan out, and while they thought they had it, they actually didn't. I mean, I've heard of that myself. So I guess what I'm still trying to understand...in that case, I guess, I wouldn't be able to get unemployment compensation for...if your bill goes through, for 13 weeks. Is that...?
