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SENATOR CHAMBERS: You mean, from 7 to 10 weeks, what...how would I compromise on that?

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Yeah. Or are you just 100 percent?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: From 5 to 11 weeks.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Well, that's draconian. That's not right.
(Laugh)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, it's fewer than 7, but it's more than 10. That's a compromise.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Oh, I...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm giving something...

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: ...I wouldn't go with that compromise.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Laugh) So what did you ask me the question for?

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: I just wondered. Just curious.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I thought we were negotiating.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: (Inaudible) philosophically.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So we're not negotiating here?

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: So you don't think that this person that was fired for mishandling a resident, you don't think it's fair that that person got a 7- or 8-week suspension from collecting unemployment?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Cunningham, all I know is what you're telling me here. You're creating a horrible situation. And I will quote for you what the courts always say: Bad case...hard cases make bad law. You don't make a law and set a standard for everybody based on the worst scenario you can come up with,
