SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. That's what I thought. Yesterday or the other day when we brought this bill up, or when it was brought up and we were discussing it, I got carried away with the reasonableness of Senator Wehrbein's argument and I voted for his amendment that would allow that interest on the taxes that were due but not paid. Yet, a few days prior to that I had pointed out that since the clerks and others want this legislation and it could result in loss of revenue to the counties, I would not support any effort by them to come here and ask for some money. They knew in advance what this bill was likely to cause in terms of loss of revenue. Senator Wehrbein insinuated himself into my mind, prevented me from remembering the vow, if you can make it that strong, that I had taken not to mitigate the loss of funds that the counties would suffer. I cannot undo that vote. I will not try to remove that amendment from the bill. I should have been more attentive and I should have recollected what I had said. But I do not have to go any further, and this is what I can offer in order that my conscience may be eased. I'm going to oppose this amendment, and if it's adopted, it gives me a reason to oppose the bill. Then I can rectify the mistake that I made earlier. Some people might think that is an extreme step to take. But again, I'm only one vote, and I need the opportunity to help us make good use of our time this session. And this bill would be a good opportunity to achieve that end. This is where I don't feel I would be a loser, even if my effort to stop this amendment from being attached and stop the bill from advancing. If the bill should advance, despite all of my efforts to obstruct it, delay it, cripple it and kill it, I don't think any great harm will result. Senator Wehrbein, when people are in the pugilistic ring, the squared circle, it is said that the most dangerous opponent is one who has been hurt. That opponent not only loses that control which a trained fighter is supposed to make use of in the ring, but he becomes desperate because he sees that the end may be in sight, so he may as well shoot the works. And he may begin to flail wildly, not try to escape...
