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Isn't that true?

SENATOR JONES: That's true.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And you think I'm going to let a tax increase bill go through just like a pop of the finger. That's what you think? Or you don't think so now.

SENATOR JONES: (Laugh) No, you don't normally do, no.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers, Senator Jones. Senator Cudaback. Senator Cudaback. Here he is.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Mr. Speaker, members, I wanted to ask Senator Wehrbein a question, please, if I may.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Wehrbein, would you yield to a question from Senator Cudaback?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Wehrbein, on the affidavit, I was going to check up on this yesterday but I didn't get time, currently, is this same statute, same mandatory thing that you're talking about with the affidavit, is that currently in?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: The affidavit is.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Yes. Okay, but evidently...I mean, the treasurers and so on, they aren't mandated necessarily to follow that, to go back like five years, six years, right?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, I...they're supposed to check, and some do. I'm not...I'm not even saying none do. I just felt that it was sometimes slighted, but I don't have any anecdotal evidence.

SENATOR CUDABACK: I mean, if Senator Chambers has a car in his backyard and hasn't...and he hasn't driven it for, like, five years because...
