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SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Uh-huh.

SENATOR CUDABACK: ...it blew a tire or something, right?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Uh-huh.

SENATOR CUDABACK: And he decides to go in tomorrow. Said, I need another car to drive.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Uh-huh.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Gets that car out, fixes the flat tire, goes down to license it. Will the treasurer stick him...I shouldn't say stick him, but charge him for the past...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: If he doesn't have an affidavit filed, they are supposed to charge him, yes.

SENATOR CUDABACK: I didn't say suppose to. I said do they? Maybe you don't know it. Don't answer if you don't want to.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: They...

SENATOR CUDABACK: They can.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: If the affidavit wasn't filed. Now, I assume that they could still file the affidavit that I have not driven this car for five years. That would...that would qualify. If he had in fact driven it, but falsely signed the affidavit that he hadn't, then...

SENATOR CUDABACK: I don't mean...and he wouldn't do anything falsely, so I'm not talking about that, but...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay.

SENATOR CUDABACK: ...but any...but currently this same thing is in statutes right now, in other words. We're not making anything...
