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SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...to fight the bill. And Senator Jones is probably confident he can get 33 votes and maybe he can, because the underlying bill has great merit, but he'll have to beat me like that on Final Reading also. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. You've heard the motion by Senator Chambers to recommit LB 279 back to committee. Open for discussion on that motion. Senator Stuthman, followed by Senators Schimek, Wehrbein, and Chambers. Senator Stuthman.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. First of all, I want to clear up a little bit of the misunderstanding that I had when we discussed this, I believe it was on last Friday, with the elderly vehicle that I had in storage. And we was discussing that affidavit portion of it and I got the feeling that that affidavit had to be filed with the treasurer, you know, that it was in storage. I've done some research on this and that is not true. You do not have to have one on file. But if in ten years that you do not use the vehicle and you want to license it again, put the license back on, you need to go to the treasurer to get it licensed and pay that current year's taxes, and some of the counties do have you file an affidavit stating that that vehicle was in storage and that you didn't use it, and that's when you do file the affidavit. Some counties do not use that affidavit, you know, to prove that it wasn't being used on the roads. Another instance would be that if you had a very new vehicle, like a 2002 vehicle, only it was in a real drastic wreck but you were planning to fix it, and it laid in a...it sat in a body shop, which sometimes it does if you're really not needing the vehicle. It could lay in the shop for a year. Then at that time is when usually an affidavit is signed stating that that vehicle, you know, wasn't on the road, you weren't using it and it was in a body shop for repairs. That's when an affidavit would be used. But as far as the back taxes on the elderly vehicle, they would only go back maybe one year. If you decided to license it during the year, you'd go back the final year. All of my vehicles are licensed in January, and say I wanted to put this vehicle back on the road in January, I would pay...pay the taxes, just like any other vehicle for that year. So that's
