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SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, if you say so I guess I'll take that, but I'm trying to understand why any county board would...or any county official would agree to bring in less money than they were getting before through this...through this process, and that's what I'm...that's the part I'm trying to understand.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator...

SENATOR VRTISKA: I supported Senator Wehrbein's amendment simply because I thought it put us back to where we were before we went to a change in the number of years that you got a license plate.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Vrtiska, do you understand why we as a Legislature do some of the things we do?

SENATOR VRTISKA: Well, you know, I'd like to say yes, but I'd have to say no.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Laugh) Okay.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Anyway, I think the thing that bothers me is that we were only trying to make things whole that appeared to be short...shorted, in a sense, and now you're saying you don't want to do that. And I thought we had advanced the amendment and we're going to continue to put it on through and be part of the bill, but I can see you're not going to do it. So I guess it's left up to Senator Wehrbein to do what he wants to do. I will probably vote against the bill, the same that he does, based on the fact that I think it's poor policy, but that's...everybody has their own opinion. And with that, Senator Cudaback, I'll turn the rest of my time back to the Chair.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Vrtiska. Senator Baker, motion to recommit.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Senator Cudaback and members. We are trying to work out a solution here and that's to get back to the base bill, LB 279, which is a six-year license plate bill. I
