"endorsement" and it changes that to read "class, endorsement, or restriction," meaning class of a driver's license, A, B, M, O, or whatever the class is. Endorsement would be a HAZMAT endorsement, so on. Restrictions might be sight, eyeglasses, and things like that. And on page 18, line 24, it strikes "course" and inserts "school." That harmonizes the language we changed before, that was missed. It simply...we're talking about schools now, not necessarily a particular course. On line 26...or, I'm sorry, page 26, lines 17 and 18, that strikes the original...or the new matter, and reinstates the old, which refers back to Section 4. For the most part, clean-up language in FA1458, and I would urge your adoption. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Baker. You've heard the opening on FA1458, offered by Senator Baker to LB 559. Open for discussion. Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President, members. Senator Baker, would you yield to a question or two?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Baker, would you yield?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes. Yes, I would.

SENATOR BOURNE: I'm just...this is an issue that I know that you and I had discussed on General File. I think it's number one of your floor amendment. And I just want to make sure exactly what your amendment does, what language is stricken. So could you, on page 5 particularly, tell me exactly what is to be included in the E & R copy of the bill, assuming your amendment is adopted?

SENATOR BAKER: It's...that...on page 5 it just reinstates the stricken matter and strikes the new language, which to me, as I read it, simply, the new matter was redundant, as far as I can tell. We're just staying where we were. One...a license...the operator's license or a state identification card shall provide a certified copy of his or her birth certificate, or a certified birth registration, which would be from the hospital rather than the state. We're just going back the way it was, Senator Bourne.
