SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. Well, what I'm suggesting, Senator Synowiecki--I'm going to read this a little more carefully--but prior to your amendment, if we put something along the lines of "notwithstanding provision (2)(a) above, if an applicant is not able to produce a Social Security number" and then go on there. But what I'm suggesting is, language here that says no person can get an operator's license unless that Social Security number is validated would trump your language, your added language. That's my quick read of it. And so I absolutely support what you're trying to do, and...because I think the way the bill was drafted had numerous unintended consequences. But I'm...what I'm afraid of is, your amendment doesn't go far enough, in that you're trying to allow spouses of people in the country legally that can't...don't have a Social Security number, you're trying to allow them the ability to get a driver's license, which is what we should be doing, so long as they can provide...or they can pass the test and meet the other criteria to obtain a license. But again, what I'm saying is that the Social Security validation that is, as I understand it, optional under the federal law, that's what you had said earlier, and we're making it mandatory on the...our DMV that they do this, I think that trumps your language. So I'm going to fit all this together. I'm going to add...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BOURNE: ...your amendment to the committee amendment, along with the Baker amendment, and all the amendments that have been on here and...placed on the bill. And it's kind of difficult to do this drafting on the floor, but that's what, I guess, we have to do. So I'm going to make sure that an individual in the situations that you and Senator Kruse talked about can still get a driver's license, even if the validation is not there. And so I'll take a look at that, and hopefully the debate will continue while we work this out. Thank you.
