SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: ...legally, Senator, and cannot obtain a Social Security number because of immigration law, to cover those.

SENATOR BEUTLER: All right. Senator Baker, let me ask you quickly, if that first sentence said "unable to legally acquire a social security number," which would limit it to the group of people that he wants to protect, would that satisfy your end?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Baker.

SENATOR BAKER: Senator Beutler, that would help, because as you said, this is a shotgun approach here, lets everybody off of requiring a Social Security card. That...I don't know that I'd support it yet. Because number one, this is a big change, and we haven't talked about this. You talk about lack of a hearing; we didn't have any hearing on this, nothing. So I don't know that I can support any part of this at this time.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Beutler, I'm sorry, your...thank you. Senator Synowiecki.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Thank you, Senator Cudaback, members. First, it's my understanding that the amendment that I have offered for consideration is the practice done by the Department of Motor Vehicles at this time. If an individual cannot produce a Social Security number, and if they are here legally and it's just simply because of the immigration rules and regs do not allow them to acquire a Social Security card, they issue them drivers' licenses and identification cards. Again, this amendment was crafted and drafted with the cooperation of the Department of Motor Vehicles. Senator Bourne had some concern with regard to the amendment, and reconciling it with other parts of the bill. And I...and quite frankly, page 6, line 6 is precisely the problem that I have seen with the bill, and the questions I've had with regard to the bill.
