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SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bourne. Senator Aguilar.

SENATOR AGUILAR: Thank you, Senator Bourne. I think it's time I weighed in on this, because this is a conversation that I've had a lot of these conversations in Transportation Committee, and I've had a lot of people call and a lot of people ask questions and have the same problems that we're having here on the floor. And my answer to them was the same as what I was told, that this followed federal statute and this was already in the law and this was what we had to do. Right now that's pretty disappointing to find out that's not exactly the truth. And I'm also in process of preparing another amendment to see if we can't reconcile some of these situations. Before I get into detail about that, if I've got any time left, I'd like to give it to Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, about two minutes and a half.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Aguilar. Thank you, Mr. President. The debate was going on so well without me that I didn't see the need to get into it. But whenever there is a matter of federal law as versus state law, I want to have something to say. The federal government cannot change a Nebraska law. The federal government cannot authorize a state official to do anything. And if there's a document which on its face is regular, the state cannot say, because the federal government says we may do this we're going to do it. I agree with Senator Bourne, I agree with Senator Aguilar, and whoever else may have commented on it that I did not hear while, by the way, I was filing for reelection. That will cause my enemies to tremble and have heartburn. But at any rate, this is such a serious area that it must be made crystal clear that we are not agreeing that the Department of Motor Vehicles can just arrogate to itself the power to do any and everything it wants to. And even if some people on the Transportation Committee go along with it, the rest of us do not. And if this language is not narrowed, then I don't think this bill is going anywhere, and DMV needs to know that. If there's any other time, I'll give it to Senator Aguilar.
