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was doing, as far as not allowing a person who is here legally to get a driver's license. In the case of the spouse of the professor, the person teaching at UNO or UNL or wherever, this would allow them to go ahead and get a driver's license. And it's been worked out with Department of Motor Vehicles and so on. So as soon as that comes up on the screen, people can look at it. I think we're moving forward. Until then, I'm like Senator Synowiecki, I guess we'll listen to the discussion and see for sure that it does address what people's concerns were. I guess until it comes up on the screen, we better talk a little bit about what it does. I guess I can briefly tell you that it says, if an applicant is not able to legally acquire a Social Security number, meaning they just simply have no basis to go get a Social Security number, such person shall be licensed to operate a motor vehicle by the state if he or she presents to the department a valid United States-based identification as approved by the director, and has fulfilled all other requirements as set forth in this act. It's put into the...what's the bill now, is the E & R amendments are the bill, but it's put into two different sections, page 6, line 23, and page 28, line 13. So it takes care of both of those areas. And like I said earlier, it also provides the exception there, on page 6, line 8, that says that no person shall be licensed to operate a motor vehicle by the state of Nebraska if such person's Social Security number is not validated, except as provided in subsection (d), which is what I just read you. So I think it solves the problems. And I see it's up on the screen. I'd be glad to answer questions and see...I think the next step of the process would be up to Senator Synowiecki. And we'll listen to Senator Kruse here in a minute, too. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Baker. It is not up yet, Senator Baker. We'll go to Senator Kruse first. Senator Kruse.

SENATOR KRUSE: Mr. President and colleagues, thank you. I rise to support the Baker amendment. Have been one, as has been identified already, whose office and individually we've been working together to come up with a way that persons who cannot get a Social Security number can still get a driver's license. The Synowiecki amendment does this, but there was a question about whether it was trumped out by an earlier part of the
