thing. The Baker amendment takes care of that. And I'm satisfied with it. My staff says it's a good one. So therefore, I will withdraw the amendment that I have on the screen. And though I'm very supportive of the Synowiecki amendment, prefer the Baker one because of the additional line within it. So I will be supporting that, just to let you all know. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: I'm sorry, Senator Kruse, but you cannot withdraw that right now. You have to wait. Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President, members. I've had a chance to look at Senator Baker's amendment that's coming up, and I think it is a good one, and I think it addresses the problems. But I do kind of want to go back to our conversation yesterday, if Senator Baker would yield to a question or two.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Baker, would you yield?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes, I would.

SENATOR BOURNE: And again, Senator Baker, I appreciate your willingness to work with those people who had concerns regarding the Social Security number. And I do think the amendment that you have that's coming is...resolves that. But I want to go back to our discussion that we had yesterday, and particularly about the federal law that it was...we had some conversation that there was a federal law that required validation of Social Security numbers. A number of us looked for that federal statute and could not find it. And then it was found, and it didn't say that there was a requirement of validation, but it was a permissive, that a state may. And you and I had kind of a discussion yesterday that, just because the federal government says that a state may do that, my argument was, is that a state DMV could not do that unless the Legislature says that they should do that. Now, I want to just kind of ask you, current practice of DMV, if they're presented with a Social Security number, is to verify or validate that number?

SENATOR BAKER: That's correct.
