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SENATOR BAKER: Well, that's how they're trace...running...tracking these people. And I don't know the process there exactly, whether they're sharing it directly with child support enforcement. I don't know. But if somebody presents a driver's license, they assume that that's a valid form of ID in, say, Georgia is where this case happened. And they ran it back according...some database, and found it matched with a Social Security number that was delinquent on child support. And I don't know the exact process, but I do know they're connected.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay. Do you know how long DMV has been doing this, the validation?

SENATOR BAKER: I think two years.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay.

SENATOR BAKER: Approximately two years. And they pointed out that they did come to the Appropriations Committee and ask for authority to spend cash fund to do this, 3 cents per vehicle regis...or driver's license is what they were using, 3 cents. And...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay.

SENATOR BAKER: ...that's the process.

SENATOR BOURNE: The fiscal note that's on this bill then is not associated with the verification of the Social Security number?

SENATOR BAKER: I think it's cleaning up some process dealing with the old paper drivers' licenses, and so on. It's still the transition over to the digital drivers' licenses, and a variety of issues.

SENATOR BOURNE: Okay, so they're not asking...DMV is not asking for an additional appropriation to do something that they're already doing?
