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to require it if they don't validate it? So I...you may be concerned, but it's just...we've got to do these things if we want to prevent identity theft. There's also a part of the bill in here that we haven't discussed any length, I don't know that we discussed at all, on page 6, line 9. There's a process by...whereby if the license is issued and the department is unable to validate the Social Security number at that time, then it's later run through and not valid, they have a 45-day period for that person to explain what's wrong, or rectify the question...or the problems with it. So there's a 45-day period in there before they can cancel the license. So there are some safeguards for someone who actually maybe falls through the crack with a change in a name because of a marriage or divorce or something like that. And they can still...they get the license and then rectify the problem. They have 45 days to do that. The amendment itself has been discussed. It narrows the focus on what Senator Synowiecki and Bourne and Aguilar wanted to do. It simply says that if a person is not able to legally acquire a Social Security number, then such person shall be licensed to operate a motor vehicle by the state of Nebraska if he or she presents to the department a valid United States-based identification as approved by the director, and has fulfilled all other requirements as set forth in this act. We're making some copies of all these 30 different U.S.-based forms of identification they can use. And there's some wide-ranging ones that I wasn't aware of, Senator Schimek certainly wasn't aware of, 30 different ones, though. So anyone who'd like to look at that, they certainly can. So that would be the United States-based identification. Some of them are naturalization papers, citizenship papers, and so on, obviously. So it's a wide variety of IDs that they can use. I would simply ask that we adopt this amendment, FA1462. It does what we were trying to get at, narrows the focus, and still allows these people, who are here legally, to get a driver's license, even though they cannot obtain a Social Security number. With that, I would return the rest of my time to the Chair. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Baker. You've heard the opening on FA1462, offered by Senator Baker to LB 559. Senator, your light was the first one on. I assume you did not...thank you. Senator Synowiecki.
