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80 percent of the deaths are in the rural areas, but are these...are these people all rural people, or are these people that are coming out from the metropolitan areas and going into the rural areas and having problems then?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Okay. The only accurate answer I can give you to that is these are people with blood in their veins, they have a heartbeat, and at the end of the situation they no longer have a heartbeat.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Okay. Okay. Thank you. So this was when you...when you made the statement, you know, the rural senators should listen up, I did listen up, and then I had that question. So okay.

SENATOR AGUILAR: Thank you, Senator.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Yeah. Thank you. I'll return the balance of my time to the Chair.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Stuthman. Senator Erdman. Senator Erdman.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Thank you, Mr. President. I was informed by some of my colleagues that my time is running, so I will proceed. I was actually going to ask a similar question to what Senator Stuthman asked, and I don't know of the details, and I looked at Senator Aguilar's information off the floor here. I don't know if that 80 percent includes Interstate 80. I don't know, you know,...and I am sympathetic to the reality of what Senator Aguilar is trying to do here, but I think when I look at the information that I've received back from my constituents, a lot of them are asking me, well, don't we have a reckless driving provision; you know, you can get somebody for reckless driving? Don't we have other provisions in law where those individuals can be convicted? And the answer to them is, well, yes, we do. But what Senator Aguilar is trying to do is make this special provision more enforceable or a penalty directly in violation as opposed to a judgment call by a law enforcement individual. But Senator Stuthman already did kind of address that and I would be interested to know some more information. I
