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people to put children in a dangerous set of circumstances and not be held accountable under a law that is being drafted to deal with that very issue. They can talk all they want to about careless driving, reckless driving and so forth. This is a specific item that can be cut out from the general run of how vehicles are operated, because it deals not with the rate of speed, not with the manner of operation, but with the location of people who are below a certain age on or in that vehicle. My rural colleagues are not that dumb. They know what this bill is about. And when they make those long stretches and reaches and pretend not to know, that irritates me greatly. Now, if they were that dumb, it would be different. If they don't know any more than that, you cannot hold them accountable for more. But they know better because they express more sense than that when they're talking about a bill they want. In the Ag Committee yesterday, Senator Kremer sounded like a person trained in the law, so I'm not going to let him dummy-up today and get away with it. I've heard Senator Schrock defend bills that he wanted, that would help his constituents, and I'm not going to let him get away with it. And I've heard several of my colleagues defend these ethanol ripoffs, so I'm not going to let them get away with it. So you all love ethanol, some of you all love unborn children, but you all suddenly don't understand what it means to protect children, and suddenly that is a bad thing. A senator asked me what would be the difference between what I said would be my approach toward rural bills, what would be the difference between that and what I'm doing right now with the session, and I called his attention to the fact that numerous bills have moved on and numbers of them have not received any or much comment from me. So I have not dealt with every bill in the way that I could. And bills that I have dealt with, I have offered amendments, and when the amendments were adopted or as much had been done to the bill as could be done, I left it alone. So people need to pay closer attention and they will pick up nuances which are not that difficult to pick up. I support the amendment that Senator Beutler is offering. I will support Senator Aguilar's bill. And I don't know what my rural colleagues are going to do. They, half the time, can't even get together and agree among themselves on something that affects their area. But it seems like they can coalesce and agree that the children ought not be protected. They can do that. I think
