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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, okay.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...I don't...I shouldn't have said it that way. Of course it's important that we understand it. But I think this is a rather small matter. I think that's what I mean to say, that it's not earth-shattering matter that we're talking about here.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Small matter?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Schimek, a sperm is a very small entity, right?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It can create repercussions far in excess of its size. Is that correct?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: The "Bibble" says...the "Holly Bibble," some would say the Holy Bible, says that it's the little foxes that destroy the vines. So the reason I want to be clear on some of this is so that I will know why these steps are being taken. Because the language was drafted by the Guard. If a deputy adjutant general is surplusage, if a chief of staff is surplusage, and we want to allow the Adjutant to appoint an assistant,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...why do we maintain in statute these terms that mean nothing and that probably will continue to mean nothing?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: It's not that they don't mean anything, Senator. These titles indicate a method of organization, internal organization. So in that sense you're right. Why are
