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SENATOR SCHIMEK: There are degrees of competency.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Could Senator Vrtiska's staff ask that person to show us the statutory authorization for that conclusion?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: We can try to find it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Probably not this morning yet because this person is not in the building.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's okay, because I'm not going to keep us here much longer. But I do have one amendment that I'm going to offer. I see Senator Vrtiska standing there long-suffering.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator, I'll give you...is it my time or your time that we're on now? (Laugh) I'll give the rest of my time.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Schimek, it's your time, but the time is up.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Oh, okay.

SPEAKER BROMM: (Visitors introduced.) Senator Chambers, you're recognized to close on your amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I am going to withdraw that pending amendment, and the next one that I'm offering is a serious amendment that I'm going to get a vote on. Again, it deals with some language.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Chambers, are you withdrawing that amendment?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Not yet. I'll give the word when the word is given, but not until. I want the opportunity to make clear the approach that I'm taking. Through our discussion of some of these items, I believe the representatives of the Guard are aware of areas in the bill that might need some additional explanation.
