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would pay them. The U.S. government would control them and all these provisions of the Servicemembers Act would apply. So we have to keep separate in our minds the federalization of the guard, which we are not dealing with, and the state mobilization for a state purpose. That could be if there had been a tornado, if there had been a flood, or some other things that might be in the nature of national disasters or emergencies. There are too many items being brought from the federal law into the state law,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...in my opinion. There is the creation of a multitude of crimes, something that I never have been in favor of, the proliferation of new crimes. I'm not going to try to correct all of those things before releasing this bill to be moved, but I want it crystal-clear that I am going to deal with this bill when we get to Select File. And if it takes 20 hours, people want to move the bill and not do the work on General File, I will do it here or I will do it there. It seems that those who have an interest in the bill would rather do it there. Makes me no difference, it will serve every purpose that I want to use the bill for over there as well as it will here. And I want to thank Senator Vrtiska for giving me that time. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: You're now on your time, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, I think I ought to state what my amendment is so that people will not be alarmed and think that it in any way weakens the bill or alters its direction. I am eliminating these words, "any officer exercising this authority" and am replacing all of those words with the word "who;" "who" adequately expresses what all of these words are designed to convey. I would like to ask Senator Vrtiska a question about this amendment that I'm discussing.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Will you yield, Senator Vrtiska.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Yes, I will.
