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SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are you asking that when these things are brought before us I not discuss them?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So what is it you're asking of me?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, I think that we were on the bill three hours yesterday. We've been on it an hour this morning and we don't really seem to be getting anywhere. And I was wondering then if what I asked you this morning, and I thought you affirmatively replied this morning, if that is still good...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...if we could still do that?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Schimek. And, Senator Chambers, you may continue. This will be your third time, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President and Senator Schimek, I had one amendment that was pending when we came up here. I said I wanted to process that amendment. I said I will let the bill...I will release it to move forward, but if any amendments are offered, I'm going to discuss them. I didn't offer this amendment, and this amendment is broader than the language in the green copy. One thing I know how to do is read. And although English is not my indigenous language, meaning based on my origin in Africa, I can understand English pretty well. And people are not going to get me to do what Mayor Richard Daley had asked reporters to do when they would quote him exactly as he spoke. He told them, don't write what I say, write what I mean. So my response would be, well, Mayor, say what you mean. I am prepared to discuss this bill for however long is necessary. It might encourage people to do a better job of drafting their legislation before it gets here. I'm not going to wear out. I will take up all of the time every day and my
