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SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. You know, I still find that curious, in the sense that it seems to me that one who drafts a particular term ought to be responsible for it when you get to the area of exculpatory clauses. Let me ask you this. If I'm...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...the elderly gentleman who...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Your time is up, but you may continue, Senator Beutler. Your light is next. And this will be your third time, as you...

SENATOR BEUTLER: If I'm the elderly gentleman who's interested in a trust agreement, maybe for the first time in my life working in the trust area, I don't characteristically work with lawyers all that much on what I've done. So I come into the trust officer, who I trust, and I indicate that I want a trust agreement, and he provides me with standard clauses, and it has some exculpatory term in it that frees me, the bank, from liability in certain instances, of negligence, for example. And you're the trust officer, and you know this law, so you're going to say, well, I want to send this to your counsel. Right? That's what's going to happen?

SENATOR QUANDAHL: I...that's what's going to happen.

SENATOR BEUTLER: And he's going to say, well, I don't think we need to do that; I'm hiring you to make up this trust agreement. And the bank trust officer says, well, I need to send it to your counsel. And so he says, well, I worked with John Jones once. He's a divorce lawyer. I had him for my divorce. Send it to him. So the bank sends the agreement to the divorce lawyer. The divorce lawyer calls the client and says, I got this agreement in the mail; what do you want me to do? And the client says, well, I'm working with the trust officer on this; don't do anything with it. And now what does this law mean? Does this law mean the trust officer can call the client and say, I sent this to your attorney; is he okay with it? He says, well, the attorney didn't really look at it all that much, but it's okay, go ahead. Now, has he been represented by
