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Now, that lady was a responsible gambler. Certainly there are people who aren't responsible gamblers. But do you think that they aren't doing that now? We have an opportunity here, folks, today, or the rest of this week, to allow the constituents of this state to see if they want to vote for expanded gambling. And I think the Legislature should not put into the constitution something that is going to bind...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR JANSSEN: ...every future legislator in years to come.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Janssen. Senator Johnson.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Mr. Speaker, members of the Chamber, when my colleague here, Senator Schimek, and Senator Janssen arose, they said something like this: Simply not going to get a consensus on one. Well, maybe we ought to try. And we aren't getting a consensus on all of these others. I don't think there's anybody in the Chamber...maybe the one consensus we do have is that we don't like what is being proposed in the initiatives. I think everybody in the Chamber will agree, these are bad ideas. I'm certainly not a gambling proponent. The...I don't gamble, except maybe on an office pool, is about my concept of gambling. But there's a couple of things that we need also to think about. And I mentioned that in the past once, and that's this, and again, use your choice of words, that the racetracks did--that is past tense--and certainly the racetracks, Ak-Sar-Ben and many others, did a great service to the youth in this state, particularly 4-H and other activities, and they're to be complimented for that. But the fact of the matter is, is that our racetracks have gone steadily downhill, for whatever reasons, over the last several decades. I don't think that it should be this Legislature's responsibility, with all of the difficulties that we have now, not only \$200 million shortfall, but perhaps another \$150 million on top of that. Racetracks should not be the top of our priority for resuscitation. They're on life-support now. Maybe it's time to pull the plug, if that is where they're at. One of the things that I think that we do need to consider, though, and that's this. If we do have a casino, one casino--and let's put it in any county that
