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we want, Lancaster, Douglas, you name it--I think that there are certain inherent benefits that that particular area gets. In reading the World-Herald this morning, there are people that think that there are no inherent benefits. But I think that's somewhat in dispute. I think filling hotels, restaurants, shopping centers, et cetera, all are benefits. If indeed that is the case, then that is the benefit to that surrounding area to that casino. If they get this benefit, then I really think that the state's share of the revenue that is generated from this casino operation should be spread as equitably as we can in the other counties. I'd yield the rest of my time to Senator Smith to comment on my last statement.

SPEAKER BROMM: You have one minute, Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Senator Johnson. If I heard those correctly...your remarks correctly, I share your concern, and certainly the distribution of what revenues there might be, because the cost will be incurred across the state of expanded gambling. When you talk about filling up hotels and so forth, I'm glad you bring that up. And I'll try to address this in the few seconds remaining. But I think we need to look at the differences. And when we talk about an economy within a gambling area, that's very relevant, because whether we have one casino or thousands across Nebraska, we're talking about a limited economy. I mean, Omaha is doing a great job with developing themselves, but they're no Las Vegas, with or without a casino. And to look at destination gambling such as Las Vegas, where they bring in dollars from outside their economy instead of cannibalizing their own economy, that to me is a...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR SMITH: ...much different scenario. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
