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not very concerned about that being next door to us either. So I find it kind of interesting that we end up having to pay the bill for \$150 million. And I think it's a tragedy to this state. Now, let's get back to what we're talking about. Senator Smith, a couple of things. One is this, is that, see, I look at the regional convention center in Omaha as having the ability to get outside people, that is, out-of-state people, to come to Nebraska. This is designed not as just a state convention center, as Kearney or someplace like that might be, but it's a regional convention center. So if you do put a first-class casino next to it, then theoretically at least the person coming in for the trade show at the convention center will go there rather than over to Council Bluffs. Now, with that in mind, we've had a couple of words thrown around here, and the last one particularly was by our Speaker, using the word "trust." Now, I'm going to take you at your word this morning that this amendment of one casino was put in in good faith, in that by putting in this amendment of one casino,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR JOHNSON: ...that means what you are doing is you are clearing up the bill so that this is now an acceptable bill for you, and that you can vote on that. It's my presumption that this is...makes it a better bill, and you can vote for it, and that I can trust you, as we've been talking around here, the members of this body can trust you on this. And I guess that what it really comes down to is that you tell us your real intentions on this. This is something that I can buy into. But I am not here to play games. So I think not only would I like to know where you stand, but the members of this body will.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR JOHNSON: If this is there, are you going to vote for the main bill?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Johnson. Members, try to keep in mind the microphone and try to speak directly into it. Members do want to hear what you have to say. Thank you. Senator Smith.
