SENATOR JONES: They've already been on the ballot. Say all of them got 51 percent except one. They got 60 percent. So the one with the most votes will go into our constitution.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Right, yes.

SENATOR JONES: Okay, the ones that they're trying to get on the ballot, there's going to be a lot of money supporting them trying to get on. So the one we're trying to get on the ballot, where does the money come to help it get on? I guess that's my next question.

SENATOR JANSSEN: Where does the money come to put ours on the ballot?

SENATOR JONES: Yes.

SENATOR JANSSEN: It goes on the ballot with 30 votes. There is no money involved there.

SENATOR JONES: That's what I'm getting at, if there is nobody...money to support it after it gets on the ballot, I'm wondering if the chances of it passing compared to some others that a lot of money might be given to them. I guess that...

SENATOR JANSSEN: Well, a lot of the money goes in getting the signatures, Senator Jones. They pay for people who...if you want to sign one of those, they'll pay you two or three bucks.

SENATOR JONES: Okay. Well, thank you, Senator Janssen, and that's some of the questions I've been concerned about. I haven't had anybody from my district call and tell me that I should vote for this or should not vote for it. But, anyway, I think some of them questions need to be answered before it goes out there. And I think that they should be answered here on the floor as far as the one that we're trying to put on the ballot to see whether there is support that way. Thank you.
