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discussion on the first part of the divided question? Senator Bourne, did you wish to address the...?

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President and members. And I thank Senator Jensen for introducing this amendment. But I didn't realize we were going to divide this, however, that's...that's a fair way to approach it. I do appreciate Senator Jensen's willingness to work on this, as well as Senator Stuhr, but I don't believe the amendment goes far enough. And when we talked about this on...earlier on General File, my sense was, is that, while this is an industry that absolutely needs to be regulated, the bill as drafted, and I think even the amendment as drafted, while it goes a ways towards helping it, it's seriously overregulating an industry. And I've always kind of, since my years here, I've kind of always had an eye on keeping regulation as minimal as possible while still protecting the public, and it seems to me that this is an area, these tattoo artists, body artists, this is an area that needs some regulation in order to protect the public from the various diseases that we heard about on General File that could be transmitted via tattoos. I do think that the approach that we've taken here is fairly heavy-handed. And while Senator Jensen's amendment takes away the 6,000-hour apprenticeship, it takes away some of these other odds and ends, I think that we need to more narrowly focus on exactly what we should be doing here with tattoo artists. Would Senator Combs yield to a question?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Combs, would you yield?

SENATOR COMBS: Of course.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Senator Combs. And the reason I want to ask you a couple questions is your background is as a nurse. And we had some discussions on General File about I wanted some evidence or some proof that there actually have been blood diseases transmitted via a tattoo artist, and you had indicated, and perhaps rightfully so, that sometimes you won't even be able to ascertain that those were transmitted for years down the road.
