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of our body, he kind of indicated that sometimes radiologists will use permanent ink or permanent marking on people to guide the radiation beam. So those people, those radiology technicians, would have to be covered under the tattoo artists or the body artists' bill in order to put indelible marks on individuals who are undergoing radiation. I think that's overregulating. I'd give some more examples of overregulation, in my opinion. We talked about how, in order to qualify for a license, you have to comply with the Nebraska Cosmetology Act, you have to be 18 years of age. I don't know why we would have it be an 18-year-old when we only require in this state that an individual stays in school until they're 16. And yet, we're saying you can leave school at 16, but you can't earn a living if you want to be a body artist until you're 18. Now I know that Senator Redfield has a...has a bill, I think that she's prioritized this year, that changes that age to 18, you have to stay in school to 18, but the current status of the law, anyone can drop out of school when they're 16 years old. Well, if they want to be a body artist, they can't until they're 18 years old. I personally feel that's overregulation. This individual also has to have a high school diploma or equivalent education. Well, why is that relevant as it relates to putting on a tattoo or doing a piercing? Has submitted evidence of completion of education or training as prescribed, well, that training, as we talked about, was 6,000 hours. Now I realize that that is...the 6,000 hours is relevant towards the grandfathering provision. So by that I mean an existing tattoo facility, in order to grandfather or become...be eligible to license under that component, you have to have 6,000 hours of experience, and it says specifically documentation as prescribed by the department of 6,000 hours of experience satisfactory to the department in the particular practice of body art for which the person is applying for a license. So the key words there are 6,000 hours of experience satisfactory to the department. Does that mean they worked at a tattoo parlor for 30...or for 6,000 hours, which is 37 months, or did they actually apply 6,000 hours worth of tattoos? That's unclear and, in my mind, that's overregulation. Now I will give you that's for the grandfather component, but if we say, in order to grandfather in, an experienced tattoo artist has to have 6,000 hours of experience over three years, and again like I mentioned on General File, an
