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attorney doesn't have 6,000 hours of education. A physician who finishes medical school can become a cardiologist with less training than is in the...is in the bill. So I would have to say that's overregulation. And again I will tell you...oh, then here's another area, and...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR BOURNE: ...a person performing body piercing or branding has to submit to any other standards which the board may adopt and promulgate by rules and regulation, any other standards. That, in my mind, is too broad and over-regulatory. We also talked about, on General File, that if the license of a body art facility has been revoked, it may not be reinstated. We are taking people's livelihoods without giving them due process. It's a clear constitutional violation. So I appreciate Senator Stuhr. On General File, she said she's willing to work with anyone that has concerns. Well, now she's indicating that it is not overly broad, and I...and I disagree with her. What I was discussing earlier with Senator Combs about what is the real harm that we're trying to stop here, what is the policy we're trying to enact, and what it is, is we are trying to prevent diseases that are transmitted through a needle in a person's blood. So if they use the same needle on the first person to get a tattoo, and then use the same needle on the second person, the potential to transmit a disease exists. That's what I think we should focus on. We should...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time. Thank you, Senator Bourne. (Visitors introduced.) Senator Cunningham.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members. I haven't been involved in this debate really at all, although I am very much in favor of the underlying idea for this legislation. I was...I'm in the Health Committee and heard the testimony and the kids from York, I believe it was, that were in fifth and sixth grade, getting tattoos without their parents' permits...or permission, I think that's wrong. But I just wanted to address one thing that Senator Bourne just said. Senator Bourne, you were talking about the 18-year-olds and you could quit school at the age of 16 but, yet, you couldn't be a
