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SENATOR COMBS: Yeah. Okay, and as a nurse, because I'm not a member of the Health Committee, although I'd dearly love to be, but I'm not.

SENATOR BOURNE: Oh, I thought you...I thought you voted on this bill.

SENATOR COMBS: No, I helped cosponsor it, but...

SENATOR BOURNE: Oh, okay.

SENATOR COMBS: Yeah.

SENATOR BOURNE: I knew you were associated with it.

SENATOR COMBS: But, yeah.

SENATOR BOURNE: I'm sorry.

SENATOR COMBS: No, I'd love to be on the Health Committee, if you can arrange that for me. (Laugh)

SENATOR BOURNE: I'll see what I can do. Senator Jensen.

SENATOR COMBS: Yeah, that would be...that would be a major component. But again, I think it's like protecting the public from what potentially could go wrong when you work on somebody's hair. You know, you could get dye in their eyes or you could improperly...I mean, there's some far-fetched things that I think that a good body of knowledge, inclusive of the needle thing, which would be the main, you know, my main concern. But again, to target a very, very specific body of knowledge like that as being the only requirement to protect the public from things that could go wrong, I almost think it might be too restrictive. And again, I'm not for "big gubment." I mean, I'm...you know, I'm not for that, but I also want to protect the public and...

SENATOR BOURNE: Senator Combs, let me ask you this, as you're...you are a registered nurse.
