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cannot win the war. You win at this point, but you invested so much in procuring that win that you lose the overall struggle. There is nothing that would prevent HHS from requiring 6,000 hours as it exists in the statute now, the proposed statute, prior to the amendment that we're looking at that Senator Jensen is offering. This provision dealt only with a certain number of hours of experience. If we adopt the language that Senator Jensen is presenting to us, we are adding a "training" as a requirement. Now, having said that, I want to ask Senator Jensen another question or two.

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes. I'm...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Jensen, I'm still...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...not up to speed entirely, so you're going to have to help me, if you can, but you may need to look something up too. Does the bill, in the form that it exists now, prior to your amendment that you're offering or with your amendment, declare what the training shall consist of?

SENATOR JENSEN: In the grandfathering clause, no.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But in the bill itself.

SENATOR JENSEN: It does talk about training after that for new individuals.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So what the department could require is the same training for those being grandfathered in as will be required of those who are newly entering the profession. Isn't that true?

SENATOR JENSEN: They could, yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Jensen. Members of the Legislature, I'm not attacking Senator Jensen. I'm not being critical of Senator Jensen. I am not trusting of departments and agencies when we give them the authority to set rules and
