SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Stuhr.

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. I do appreciate some of the questions that have been raised. I wish some of you could have been at the hearing the day that we presented the bill and the fact that we had two practitioners come and continually said to me, following the hearing, and I believe stated it during the hearing, that this bill does not go far enough; that they were very pleased with what was presented in the bill as far as what was expected in the ways of regulation. And I think that that's an important comment. And I pointed out to them, following the hearing, that we don't put everything into our statute; that we do allow for a department to come and establish rules and regs and that, at that time, they would have an opportunity then to come and testify because it is necessary to have a hearing before any rules and regs are passed, so that they would have an opportunity then again to come and express their views. I do not agree with Senator Bourne saying that this is a barrier to businesses, that this goes too far. I believe if you will go to Section 4 in the amendments, which is on page 4, there are a number of other areas that are included under the Cosmetology Act, and what we have done is also include the body art area. And some of those are nail technology, esthetics, electrology, and what it points out then to all of these areas, that some of the general areas that they will be involved in involve the use of implements and chemicals that if used or applied improperly can be hazardous to human health and safety. Inadequate sanitation in the practice of cosmetology, nail technology, as all of those areas that I have stated before, can encourage the spread of contagious diseases, infections, and infestations to the detriment of health and safety of the public. The knowledge of proper sanitary techniques, the proper use of implements and chemicals can best be gained by rigorous and extensive training
