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perfect segue. That's my next question. On page 31, it talks about the licensure and regulations of persons performing body art shall not be construed to restrict or prohibit a governing body of a county, city, or village from providing further requirements. My question to you is, you know, we are all about local control here at...in the Legislature. I mean, I've been here five or six years. You've been here a few more than that and if you had a nickel for every time you heard "local control," you could retire and so could I. So my question is, is why is the state involved in this when the city of Omaha or the city of Bradshaw or any other city can regulate this entity, this business, in a way that they think makes most sense?

SENATOR JENSEN: They could, and we do have regulations in...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR JENSEN: ...in Lincoln. I don't know that we have regulations in Omaha. I just don't know. Maybe we do; maybe we don't.

SENATOR BOURNE: I don't know either, and I guess what I'm thinking is if, okay, this is a problem in Bradshaw, let Bradshaw city council or village council, or whatever it is there, let them adopt a regulation that deals with this. Or if there's a problem in Omaha specific to people selling a facility to someone else and in the original bill we make them become relicensed, you know, let each individual city or village or county come up with their own plan that makes sense for them. Why would...why wouldn't we do that?

SENATOR JENSEN: Well, the only thing...the biggest problem with that is that you certainly have people from Bradshaw that are going to go to York or Lincoln or somewhere else and then every city, every community might be different. I think it is better to have a state regulation and then the cities can certainly go above that if they want to. But certainly there would be a general guideline from the state...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.
